Born in London in 1953, Diane Abbott attended the Harrow County grammar school and went on to Newnham College Cambridge where she obtained a Masters degree in history.

In 1987, Diane made history by becoming the first black woman ever elected to the British Parliament. She has since built a distinguished career as a parliamentarian, broadcaster and commentator.

In 2008, Diane was awarded the *Spectator*/Threadneedle Speech of the Year Award and a Human Rights Award from Liberty. Diane is founder of the London Schools and the Black Child initiative, which aims to raise educational achievement levels amongst Black children.







Romalyn Ante FRSL is a prize-winning British-Filipino poet, essayist, and editor. She grew up in the Philippines and migrated to her second home, Wolverhampton, in 2005. She was the first East-Asian to win the *Poetry London* and Manchester Poetry prizes. She is co-founding editor of *harana poetry*, a magazine for poets who write in English as a second or parallel language, and the founder of *Tsaá with Roma*, an online interview series with poets and other creatives. She is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature, was awarded the Jerwood Compton Poetry Fellowship and is an editorial board member for *Poetry London* magazine.

Romalyn's debut poetry collection **ANTIEMETIC FOR HOMESICKNESS** (Chatto & Windus, 2020) received wide acclaim and prize attention.

But when electrifying Marcus Felix is appointed as headteacher, Kwame must reckon with himself as he never has before. Can he face the ghosts of his childhood? How will he learn to move through the world without losing who he is? And where does existing stop and living begin?

Extraordinarily, Rene Salt (born Rywka Ruchla Berkowitz in Poland, 1929) was able to stay by her mother Salla's side throughout their entire five-and-a-half-year Holocaust experience.







But what caused the explosion? Accident or environmental terrorism? The injured man knows, but he's not talking. The rig's corporate director, Jim Ross, is Carrie's friend, but he is wrestling with both the catastrophic aftermath and his own guilty secrets. But it is only Ross who believes — against all evidence and odds — that Carrie is alive.

As the oil spills spreads, Ross battles to mount a rescue mission to find Carrie. But is his obsession merely a way to try to assuage his own culpability? And what real hope is there that she could have survived?

LOOKING AT WOMEN LOOKING AT WAR: A WAR AND JUSTICE DIARY is Amelina's deeply moving and highly anticipated posthumous gift to her country. It began as the war diary of a Ukrainian novelist turned war crimes researcher following Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine in 2022 and evolved into a story about a number of extraordinary women. It follows the paths of female journalists, human rights defenders, lawyers, and volunteers who document war crimes in Ukraine while the conflict is still ongoing.

Amelina described her book as 'detective story' in which she pursues not only the perpetrators but the quest for justice. The heroines of the book include Evgenia Zakrevska, a prominent lawyer turned soldier who helps to liberate towns in the Kharkiv region and participates in a historical trial online from the frontline, Oleksandra Matviychuk, who leads an initiative documenting tens of thousands of war crimes and wins a Nobel Peace Prize in 2022, and Yulia Kakulya-Danylyuk, the director of the Kharkiv Literary Museum who helps document the destruction of cultural heritage.

Every heroine has a connection to a prominent Ukrainian dissident or the so-called Executed Renaissance, a generation of Ukrainian writers killed by the Soviet regime in the 1930s. The stories of today's Ukrainians are thus interconnected with the dramatic history of the 20th century in the bloodlands.

LOOKING AT WOMEN LOOKING AT WAR combines elements of reportage, interviews and reflection, and is influenced by the work of Svetlana Alexievich and Ryszard Kapuscinski.

Victoria's reflections now carry an unbearable poignancy in the wake of her own death, killed by injuries sustained in a Russian missile strike as she dined in a pizza restaurant in Kramatorsk.

The story follows three generations of the family of an old Soviet military pilot – a Korean war veteran – who settle in a city once a cultural centre of Europe, a place variously called Lemberg, Lwów, Lvov, and Lviv. The apartment that this Soviet family has inhabited since the '70s is, by coincidence, the former childhood home of Stanislaw Lem. A Polish writer of Jewish origin, Lem is one of the few survivors of the Holocaust in Lviv, who leaves the city forever after World War II. Because it is hard, if not impossible, for the humans to talk about the city's complicated past and their own traumatic memories of Soviet and Nazi atrocities, it is a dog named Dom who accepts the challenge to pick up the pieces of the family story and Ukraine's history.

Through Dom's voice, Amelina presents a fresh perspective on critical issues such as the supposed east-west divide in Ukraine, themes of migration and displacement, Lviv's history as a major Polish and Jewish metropolis, its dark history with the Holocaust, and its multiple transformations over the tumultuous twentieth century.





Sofia's mother is a white returnee, forced to return to Lisbon along with 200,000 Portuguese-Angolans during the chaotic decolonisation process. Sofia inherited her passion for African music from her mother and stepfather and dreams of visiting Angola one day, a country she misses even though she's never been there.


Viking and Mari are the two Norwegian officers who arrested Kalaf. Having Kalaf's fate in his hands made Viking assess his own life: what if he leaves Europe to find Ava his first girlfriend, for whom he still has feelings, and who now lives in Beirut. Viking finds himself in the middle of the crowd at the Øya music festival. He looks up at the stage and sees the Angolan there, a free man. Viking wants to feel free too. He will fly to Beirut on the very next plane.

AVENUES BY TRAIN opens in 1974, with the news that yet another girl has been abducted by a water spirit in the small town of Miner's Drift. In the same incident another young girl, Natsai, is touched by the water spirit but manages to escape. The protagonist of the book, Jedza, is Natsai's younger brother, aged seven when we first encounter him in 1984. When Jedza later has a similar escape in a tragic incident involving a train and the death of his close boyhood friend, he is convinced that his life is haunted. He comes to believe that his life is stuck in a loop of hardship in Miner's Drift.

Jedza leaves for Harare in the hope that he will escape the darkness and superstitions of the small town. He instead discovers that the city has even deeper spiritual roots than Miner's Drift and the mysticism he encounters in the city leads him to come to terms with the spiritual forces in his bloodline and to eventually confront and resolve his traumatic past.

Inspired by the author's experience as a practising Catholic in his youth, the novel explores the conflict between Shona spiritualism and Christianity in urban contemporary Zimbabwe. With wry humour evident from its early chapters, this is a bildungsroman of sorts, where nostalgic childhood reminiscences are juxtaposed with scenes depicting the social and economic degeneration of the country, inspired by the author's experience living in The Avenues, a red-light district of Harare.

This eclectic, playful and experimental novel showcases a fresh new voice in contemporary African writing, recalling the fast-paced, riotous satire of Alain Mabanckou and Fiston Mwanza Mujila. Whilst paying homage to his literary heritage in this consciously intertextual novel, Mudzingwa pushes the boundaries of both content and form, with strands of magical realism running alongside hyper-realist immersion, shifts in perspective and time, and a multiplicity of different narrative voices and styles.

In 2014, the Russian army, with support from local militants, occupied parts of Ukraine's two easternmost regions, Donetsk and Luhansk; regions that were the beating industrial heart of the socialist utopia in the Soviet era, and where coal extraction has exhausted both the human population and the natural resources. These regions have suffered from the post-Soviet chaos for decades.

In late 2016, the author set out on a research trip to the East to answer the common questions of those who've never been to the region. He takes his readers on a complicated, painful and hopeful trip across the Ukrainian East, guiding them through encounters with local citizens, archival research, and conversations with prominent cultural figures from the region, such as writer Serhij Zhadan and historian Ihor Kozlovskyi, held hostage and released after 700 days of captivity. Readers will encounter the miners, the Belgian and British investors who founded the eastern cities, the priceless coal, events of the First and Second World War, the bloody Soviet history, the activists who are now working to improve the country, and sweet memories of a lost paradise.

Oleksandr writes that he had never been to Eastern Ukraine until 2016, and wanted to better understand the part of his country where war was breaking out, investigating and debunking many of the stereotypes and myths about the region. His encounters with its inhabitants are varied and revealing, always narrated with great nuance and empathy.







Hannah and Eric are a successful couple living in North London with their three children, and Eric's father Yosef, a survivor of the camps. They are devout Jews who believe in the literal truth of the Old Testament, all except for their youngest son Tovyah. The death of Yosef - the family's link to pre-war Europe - throws the family into disarray. Elsie, the model daughter, disappears for four days, plunging the family into a living nightmare. When she returns, just as mysteriously as she left, she is strangely altered. Witnessing the complete transformation of their daughter's personality and some increasingly hard-to-explain events, Hannah and Eric begin to suspect Elsie is under the influence of black magic. Tovyah, a brilliant university student, believes his sister is suffering a mental collapse caused by his parents' antiquated beliefs. But who is right? And can the family be reconciled before tearing itself apart?

At the heart of the novel are two questions. What does it mean to be bound to an ethical and metaphysical system thousands of years old? And if you reject that system, what is left of your Jewish identity? Through revolving points of view, any certainty in the face of these questions is undermined, and we witness a family trying to reckon with both historical and personal tragedy. The result is a fastpaced literary novel, with elements of horror.



Both **APPLES** and **TEN STOREY LOVE SONG** were adapted for the stage, winning awards at the Edinburgh Fringe.
