We know we struggle with difficult conversations, but we're often not very good at the easy ones, either. Though we do it all the time, Harvard professor Alison Wood Brooks argues that conversation is one of the most complex, demanding, and delicate of all human tasks, rife with the possibility of misinterpreting and misunderstanding. And yet conversations can also be a source of great joy, each one offering an opportunity to express who we are and learn who others are—to feel connected, loved, and alive. In *Talk*, Brooks shows why conversing a *little* more effectively can make a *big* difference in the quality of our close personal relationships as well as our professional success. Drawing on the new science of conversation, Brooks distills lessons that show how we can better understand, learn from, and delight each other.

Through experiments ranging across the conversational spectrum—from speed daters who ask too few questions (or too many), to future business leaders averse to topic forethought, to traffic stops that reveal the essence of kind language—Brooks takes us inside the world of conversation, giving us the confidence and the advice to approach any interaction with more creativity and compassion. Addressing our face-to-face conversations as well as those we have by phone, email, text, and social media, *Talk* is a thoughtful guide for anyone seeking to better establish and sustain their relationships.

Alison Wood Brooks is the O'Brien Associate Professor of Business Administration and Hellman Faculty Fellow at the Harvard Business School. She studies the behavior science of conversation, teaches an award-winning course in the MBA curriculum called TALK, and chairs a program for executives called Communicating for Impact. She was named a Best 40 Under 40 Business School Professor by *Poets & Quants*.

An audacious, sweeping history in the vein of *Sapiens* and *The Dawn of Everything* that will upend everything you know about the birth of the modern world.

THE KILLING AGE is a masterful account of a period of wanton destruction, spanning the nearly two centuries between 1750 and the early 1900s across Africa, Asia, and the Americas, which Crais calls the Mortecene: the Age of Killing. Crais frames the story of industry and the development of capitalism as a part of the natural history of the planet, a fresh perspective that remains underexplored by historians of the modern era even as the wider conversation opens up to our role in perpetuating climate change.

The pioneers of the Mortecene were "merchant warlords," enterprising men spurred by the promise of the untold riches of global trade, their ambitions fueled by new systems of finance and guns in Europe, who slaughtered—or directly financed the slaughter of—human beings and animals to feed the avaricious machine of the globalizing world.

Some are familiar to us, if surprising, when held up to the light: among Crais's cadre of warlords stand business magnate John Jacob Astor and President Andrew Jackson; others are less so, like Tippu Tip of East Africa and the Comanche warriors of New Mexico. These men unleashed the worst ecological destruction since humans first colonized the planet more than 10,000 years ago. Every beaver coat and piano key, every lantern and cup of sugar, was the fruit of an ongoing extinction-level event perpetrated by these men. This catastrophe was foretold by generations of indigenous Shamans and prophets across the Global South, some of the world's first environmental activists, who led resistance movements against colonizers in the 19th century. From this period emerged the Mortecene's legacy: our interconnected world, our enlightenment, and the shared existential threat of climate change.

Clifton Crais is the Director of African Studies and Professor of History at Emory University and the author of eight books, including *Poverty*, *War*, and *Violence in South Africa* (Cambridge, 2011) and co-author of *Sara Baartman and the Hottentot Venus: A Ghost Story and a Biography* (Princeton, 2008).

Meredith Elkins PARENTING ANXIETY: Breaking the Cycle of Worry and Raising Resilient Kids

From Meredith Elkins, clinical psychologist at Harvard Medical School's McLean Hospital, comes an urgently needed and practical guide for parents who are seeking to understand and address anxiety in themselves and in their kids.

As rates of pediatric anxiety disorders climb, parents feel increasingly paralyzed by the responsibility of shepherding their children through the tumultuous emotional health landscape of today. Where parent distress and anxiety increases, child anxiety follows, fueling a vicious cycle. Many books address either child anxiety *or* parent anxiety, but this compassionate and timely book will focus on the reflexive nature of anxiety within the parent-child relationship.

With the proliferation of social media offering solutions, how can parents be sure that they are taking the "right" approach to address their family's emotional health needs – or at the very least, not making things worse? *PARENTING ANXIETY* is aimed both at families experiencing normal levels of anxiety, as well as those dealing with clinically interfering anxiety disorders. Stepping away from a one-size-fits-all approach to parenting tactics, Dr. Elkins recognizes that the pursuit of certainty in parenting is an illusion: there is no "life-hack" for parenting, and certainly none for raising kids in the context of anxiety. Dr. Elkins advocates for compassionate, calibrated exposure to "a comfortable level of discomfort" to strengthen anxiety-fighting muscles and raise resilience. In her wise, calming, and accessible guide for parents who are seeking to understand and address anxiety in themselves and their children, Elkins provides readers with an accessible roadmap that cultivates a flexible approach and promotes adaptability and resilience across all stages of development.

Meredith Elkins, PhD, is a clinical psychologist specializing in the research and treatment of anxiety and related disorders in children and families. She is an Instructor of Psychology at Harvard Medical School, and the co-program director at the McLean Anxiety Mastery Program (MAMP), an intensive outpatient program for youth with anxiety disorders. A legendary editor's reckoning with the twentieth-century novel and the urgent messages it sends.

Imagine the history of the twentieth-century novel recounted with the urgency and intimacy of a novel. That's what Edwin Frank, the legendary editor who has run the New York Review Books publishing imprint since its inception, does in *Stranger than Fiction*. With penetrating insight and originality, Frank introduces us to books, some famous, some little-known, from the whole course of the century and from around the world. Starting with Dostoevsky's Notes from Underground of 1864, Frank shows how its twitchy, self-undermining, and never-satisfied narrator established a voice that would echo through the coming century. He illuminates the political vision of H.G. Wells's science fiction, Colette and Andre Gide's subversions of traditional gender roles, and Gertrude Stein's untethering of the American sentence. He describes the monumental ambition of books such as Mrs. Dalloway, The Magic Mountain, and The Man Without Qualities to rebuild a world of human possibility upon the ruins of World War I and explores how Japan's Natsume Soseki and Nigeria's Chinua Achebe broke open European models to reflect their own, distinct histories and experience. Here too are Vasily Grossman, Anna Banti, and Elsa Morante reckoning in specific ways with the traumas of World War II, while later chapters range from Marguerite Yourcenar and V. S. Naipaul to Gabriel García Marquez and W.G. Sebald. The story as a whole is one of fearless, often reckless exploration, as well as unfathomable desolation. Throughout, we discover the power of the novel to reinvent itself, to find a way for itself, to live differently. STRANGER THAN FICTION offers a new vision of the history and art of the novel and of a dark and dazzling time in whose light and shadow we still stand.

Edwin Frank is the editorial director of *New York Review Books* and the founder of the acclaimed NYRB Classics series. Born in Boulder, Colorado and educated at Harvard College and Columbia University, he has been a Wallace Stegner Fellow and a Lannan Fellow and is a member of the New York Institute for the Humanities. He has taught in the Columbia Writing Program and served on the jury of 2015 Booker International Prize. He is a Chevalier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres, a recipient of a lifetime award from the American Academy of Arts and Letters for distinguished service to the arts, and the author of *Snake Train: Poems 1984–2013*.


In this visionary debut work from renowned computer scientist and former Google AI ethics researcher, Timnit Gebru explores how artificial intelligence got to where it is today and provides a human-centered pathway forward.

Timnit Gebru has been present at nearly every inflection point in AI's recent history. She was an engineer at Apple on the cusp of the iPhone's first release, a PhD student at Stanford's computer vision lab as her advisor compiled the enormous datasets so crucial to AI's development, and the most senior Black woman on the Ethical AI team at Google as DeepMind and Open AI took over the field of artificial intelligence. In 2020, Timnit raised the alarm about algorithmic bias while leading the Ethical AI team at Google, and her very public firing was covered in almost every major news outlet in the world.

Books on artificial intelligence often fall into two camps: those capitalizing on the hype and touting the benefits of this technology, and those addressing the real harms of AI systems. This book does something different. Part memoir, part manifesto, this book examines all the issues of AI, from data, to bias, to algorithms, and the destructive ideologies and dangerous egos underpinning the current trajectory of AI, but it goes beyond these issues and provides another way forward. Putting forth the principles we need to build other types of systems, those that help us fight inequity rather than entrench it, and the societal and technological features that would allow us to build these systems before it's too late. *THE VIEW FROM SOMEWHERE* is for anyone interested in women in science, tech culture, politics, race, bias, and, of course, artificial intelligence. Readers of Naomi Klein's *Doppelganger*, Matthew Desmond's *Poverty*, *By America*, Cathy O'Neill's *Weapons of Math Destruction*, and Shoshanna Zuboff's *The Age of Surveillance Capitalism* will be galvanized by Timnit's urgent message. Her call radically reinvents our world.

Timnit Gebru is the founder and executive director of the Distributed Artificial Intelligence Research Institute (DAIR). She received her PhD from Stanford University and co-founded the nonprofit Black in AI. Timnit has been selected as one of the BBC 100 Women of the Year, TIME 100 Most Influential People, Elle 100, Root 100, and Forbes Notable Leaders. She's been featured in *The Guardian, Wired, Harper's Bazaar, Wall Street Journal, NPR, Le Monde, Folha De S. Paulo*, and *El Confidencial* among others.

The rebirth of Italy after the Second World War is one of the most impressive political transformations in modern European history. In 1945, post-fascist Italy was devastated by war and its reputation in the international arena was nil. Yet by December 1955, when Italy was admitted to the United Nations, the nation had contested three acrimonious but free general elections, had a flourishing press, and was a leader in the re-building of Europe. The contrast with Fascism was stark. This book charts the descent of Italy into Fascism, the scale of the wartime disaster, the Italian resistance to Nazi occupation, and the establishment of the Republic in 1946. The Cold War divided, in 1947, the coalition of parties that had led the resistance to Fascism and Nazism. The book's final chapters deal with the consolidation of Italian democracy and with the statesmanship of Alcide De Gasperi, the premier from December 1945 to August 1953. The book argues, first, that De Gasperi deserves more credit than he has typically been accorded for Italy's post-war democratization and, second, that Italian democracy was constructed on a sound foundation – which is why it has been able to survive its many post-war crises. Largely based on contemporary Italian sources, the book is written in an engaging, lively way for both the general reader and specialists in Italian history.

Mark Gilbert was educated at Durham University and the University of Wales. He has taught at Dickinson College, the University of Bath, the University of Trento, and SAIS Europe, the Bologna Centre of the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies, where he is C. Grove Haines Professor of History. In 2018, he chaired the international jury of the Cundill Prize for History. He is associate editor of the *Journal of Modern Italian Studies*.

World-renowned Renaissance scholar Stephen Greenblatt (*WILL IN THE WORLD, THE SWERVE*)'s most vivid, page-turning book to date, reconstructing the brief, action-packed life of daring and subversive queer playwright Christopher Marlowe, whose transformation of English verse and wild imagination blasted a path for an exciting new wave of English literature—including his more cautious collaborator and rival, William Shakespeare.

From inauspicious beginnings as a cobbler's son in provincial Canterbury, Marlowe's astonishing gifts won him a rare opportunity for a classical education, the only reliable ladder into middle-class security and respectability. Greenblatt brilliantly evokes how the traditional study of Latin poetry – so full of eroticism, violence, pantheism, atheism, homosexual love, and other unimaginable dangers to the established order of Elizabeth's reign – would have inflamed a sensitive literary mind. He convincingly portrays how Marlowe might have been seduced into far more serious moral violation: spying on his classmates for Her Majesty's secret spy service and how this early, adventurous transgression shaped the rest of his life and work, most evidently "Dr. Faustus". It also, more than likely, led to his early, violent death at only 29.

In Greenblatt's hands, Marlowe here serves—as Lucretius and humanist Poggio Branciolini did in *The Swerve*—as the embodiment of an astonishing period of ferment and transformation in the history of Western culture. As in his National Book Award finalist *Will in the World: How Shakespeare Became Shakespeare*, Greenblatt moves seamlessly between fascinating, if scant, documentation of Marlowe's life; extraordinarily vivid, rich, and revealing contextual history of the culture and politics of the Elizabethan Age; and literary criticism of Marlowe's work that fills in the gaps and inspires the reader to return to literature for humanistic understanding.

Stephen Greenblatt is Cogan University Professor of the Humanities at Harvard University. He is the author of over a dozen books, including *Tyrant*, *The Rise and Fall of Adam and Eve, The Swerve* (winner of the 2011 National Book Award and the 2012 Pulitzer Prize); *Shakespeare's Freedom*, and *Will in the World*. His latest book, *Second Chances: Shakespeare & Freud*, co-authored with Adam Phillips, was published by Yale UP in May 2024. His honors include the MLA's James Russell Lowell Prize, the Sapegno Prize, the Distinguished Humanist Award from the Mellon Foundation, the Holberg Prize from the Norwegian Parliament, the William Shakespeare Award for Classical Theatre, the Erasmus Institute Prize, two Guggenheim Fellowships, and the Distinguished Teaching Award from the University of California, Berkeley.



Drew Harvell is Professor Emerita of Ecology and Evolutionary Biology at Cornell University and a Science Envoy to the US State Department. She is the author of Ocean Outbreak, and A Sea of Glass which were, variously, the winner of the National Outdoor Book Award for Natural History Literature, recipient of the Rachel Carson Environmental Literature Award among others. She has written for *The New York Times*, *The Seattle Times*, *The Hill*, and *CNN*, and her work has been featured in *The Atlantic, The Guardian, The New York Times, The Seattle Times, The Washington Post, Discover, Scientific American, Nature*, and other publications. She has authored over 180 academic articles in *Science, Nature, Science Advances*, and more. Dr. Harvell was featured in the awardwinning film, Fragile Legacy and is currently a science adviser for Fabian Cousteau's Underwater Space Station.

Surreal, the long-awaited, definitive biography of Gala Dalí, unmasks this famous yet little-known queen of the twentieth-century art world, who graced the canvases, inspired the poetry, and influenced the careers of her illustrious lovers and husbands with tenderness, courage, and agency.

Using previously undiscovered material, *Surreal* tells the riveting story of Gala Dalí, (1894-1982) who broke away from her cultured but penurious background in pre-Revolutionary Russia to live in Paris with both France's most famous poet Paul Éluard and Max Ernst. By the time she met the budding artist Salvador Dali in 1929, Gala was known as the Mother of Surrealism. She rapidly became his mentor and protector, marrying him in 1934 and subsequently engineering their vast fortune. At a time when artists were celebrities, Gala acted as the ambassador of the Surrealist movement, spreading its popularity across the globe. She was the survivor of two world wars, the Russian Revolution and the Spanish Civil War, and lived between France, Spain and the U.S. Gala was a heroine whose originality captivated people wherever she went, and her life story has everything to pull readers toward it: size; glamour; drama; true love, twisted love; ambition; money; art; defiance; daring, and sweeping social unrest. In this vivid, detailed rendering, Michèle Gerber Klein has brought Gala out of the shadows to reveal a charismatic figure who played a pivotal role in the art world, yet never received the full recognition she deserves.

Covering a swathe of the cultural life of the last century, the book will be published during the celebration of the movement's centenary at a time when Surrealism is enjoying a new surge in popularity.

Michèle Gerber Klein is an author and journalist, who writes frequently about art and fashion. Her first book, *Charles James: Portrait of an Unreasonable Man*, was named a *Financial Times* Best Book of 2018. 

A recent spate of naysayers, all decrying the death of romance at the hands of "the apps," are just proof that it's the only thing that can work at scale in today's realities; as traditional communities are disintegrating, technology, as it is wont to do, is re-stitching the basic bonds between humans in so many ways.

Dating websites, app parameters, and design gimmicks have become part of the set of norms by which modern courtship happens, and so many of the rules, mechanisms, conventions, and forums that we relied on before to find a partner when we operated in more insular worlds have gone out the window. We know this, and yet there has yet to be a serious appraisal of the role that online dating has played in both patching up the systemic holes that modern life has borne in our communities and weaving the new rules for connection in their place. When we wearily decide to go "back on the apps" in our umpteenth attempt at finding love, we are a part of a larger sociological phenomenon with a decades-long history that goes all the way back to the first room-sized computer matchmaker, the roots of which extend even further back into the nineteenth century. *U UP*? gives online dating its due. Informed by Hanna's deeply reported interviews with regular people from all over the world and all walks of life, this is a breezy and whip-smart work that takes us on a layered and enlightening exploration of a deeply human history—and the fascinating ways that we try to find love in a world that has changed, so very rapidly, around us.

What do barracks for British troops in the Falklands War, a floating jail off the Bronx, and temporary housing for VW factory workers in Germany have in common? *The Balder Scapa:* a single barge that served all three roles. Fitted with modular shipping containers, themselves the product of standardized global trade, the ship could become whatever the market demanded. Whether caught in an international dispute involving Hong Kong, Nigeria, Indonesia, and the Virgin Islands—to be settled in an English court of law—or flying yet another foreign "flag of convenience" to mask its ownership—the barge is ever a container for forces much larger than even its hulking self.

EMPTY VESSEL is a jaw-dropping microhistory that speaks volumes about the global economy as a whole. In following the Vessel—and its Sister Vessel, built alongside it in Stockholm—from one thankless task to the next, Kumekawa connects the dots of a neoliberal world order in the making, where regulation is for suckers and "Made in USA" feels almost quaint.

Ian Kumekawa is a historian at the Center for History and Economics at Harvard University. He is the author of *The First Serious Optimist: A. C. 



Out the front door, across the street, down the hill, and into Van Cortlandt Park in the Bronx, New York City. This is how Ben Ratliff's runs started most days of the week for about a decade. He wondered if a body in motion, his body, was helping him to listen better to the motion in music. Run the Song is also the story of how a professional critic, frustrated with conventional modes of criticism, finds his way back to a deeper relationship with music. When stumped or preoccupied by a piece of music, he starts to think that perhaps running can tell him more about what he's listening to—*let's run it*, he'll say. And with that, the reader in turn is invited to listen alongside one of the great listeners of our day in this wildly inventive and consistently thought-provoking chronicle of a profoundly unsettling time.

How does this archetype relate to the growing panic about falling birth rates in wealthy nations? Why is the term thrown about like an insult, even when there are no women or cats involved? And now that we understand the Cat Lady's cultural roots, can we claim this identity and embrace its subversive power in the 21st century?

Searingly intelligent and gloriously spiky, *CAT LADY* is a must-read for all dangerous women who dare to think and live for themselves. We see it in the vein of nonfiction books that bring a new level of edge and sophistication to a curiosity-inducing topic, such *Cultish: The Language of Fanaticism* by Amanda Montell, *Eve: How the Female Body Drove 200 Million Years of Human Evolution* by Cat Bohannon, and *Butts: A Backstory* by Heather Radke.
