After announcing his first campaign for the US presidency, Donald Trump told a television audience that life "has not been easy for me. It has not been easy for me." Building on a narrative he had been telling for decades, he spun a hardscrabble fable of how he parlayed a small loan from his father into a multi-billion-dollar business and real estate empire. This feat, he argued, made him singularly qualified to lead the country. But none of it was true. Born to a rich father who made him the beneficiary of his own highly lucrative investments, Trump received the equivalent of more than \$500 million today via means that required no business expertise whatsoever.

Drawing on over twenty years' worth of confidential tax information, including the tax returns he tried to conceal, alongside business records and interviews with Trump insiders, Russ Buettner and Susanne Craig track Trump's financial rise and fall, and rise and fall again. For decades, he squanders his fortunes on money-losing businesses and tacks his name above the door of every building, while taking out huge loans he'll never repay. He tarnishes the value of his name by allowing anyone with a big enough check to use it, and cheats the television producer who not only rescues him from bankruptcy but casts him as a business savant — the public image that will carry him to the White House. *Lucky Loser* is a meticulous, nearly-century spanning narrative, filled with scoops from Trump Tower, Mar-a-Lago, Atlantic City, and the set of *The Apprentice*. In time for his reelection campaign, here for the first time is the true accounting of the myth of Trump and his money, the self-made billionaire.

Susanne Craig and *Russ Buettner* are reporters on the investigations desk at *The New York Times*. Their 2018 exposé of then-President Trump's finances won a Pulitzer Prize.

It takes tremendous biological creativity to be a plant. To survive and thrive while rooted in a single spot, plants have adapted ingenious methods of survival. In recent years, scientists have learned about their ability to communicate, recognize their kin and behave socially, hear sounds, morph their bodies to blend into their surroundings, store useful memories that inform their life cycle, and trick animals into behaving to their benefit, to name just a few talents.

The Light Eaters illuminates the complexity of green life and challenges our understanding of agency, consciousness, and intelligence. In looking closely, we see that plants, rather than imitate human intelligence, have perhaps formed a parallel system. What is intelligent life if not a a pea seedling that can hear water flowing and make its way toward it? Zoë Schlanger takes us across the globe, reporting on both the latest discoveries in botanical research and of a field in turmoil, as pioneering scientists debate how their findings influence our understanding of what a plant is. What can we learn from and what do we owe these life forms once we come to understand their rich and varied abilities?

Acclaimed New York Times investigative journalist Susan Dominus profiles six families with several exceptionally accomplished children in order to tease apart the various factors that might have led to their success, including inherited tendencies. Dominus, herself the mother of twin teenagers, relates the fascinating trajectories of families from diverse cultural, racial, and socio-economic backgrounds, including young parents from China who fled the one-child policy to open a Chinese restaurant in Appalachia and sent four children to elite colleges and careers that give back in technology and medicine; the Groff family, whose claim to fame is not just an award-winning novelist but an Olympic athlete and a notable entrepreneur; and the Holifields, raised in the Jim Crow South and boasting two powerful attorneys, both Harvard law school graduates, and a cardiologist, all three influential in civil rights. Woven into these and other inspiring stories is an account of centuries of scientific research into the perennial question of nature versus nuture. Dominus doesn't promise a check-list of how-tos; she probes the nuances of parenting, the challenges of family ambition, and even the challenges of success itself.

Susan Dominus has worked for *The New York Times* since 2007, first as a Metro columnist and then as staff writer for the Magazine. She has studied as a fellow at the National Institutes of Health and Yale Law School, and she has won a Pulitzer Prize for public service.

Gastro Obscura Cookbook will transport readers across continents and history through food and drink. *Gastro Obscura* published to critical acclaim in 2021, and this sequel will provide all the recipes and techniques needed to make its featured foods.

The definitive narrative account of the rise and fall of affirmative action, and what might come next for a multiracial nation

In June of 2023, *The New Yorker* reporter and Harvard law professor Jeannie Suk Gersen sat in the United States Supreme Court chambers, listening to the majority opinion that reversed fifty years of historical precedent: affirmative action in university admissions would no longer be permissible. The consequences of the decision will reach far beyond the classroom, into workplaces and cultural spaces, altering DEI initiatives and programs designated for underrepresented minorities, and stifling the ability of employers to diversity their workforces. Counterintuitively, the plaintiffs in the Supreme Court case were Asian Americans, arguing Harvard discriminated against them in admissions processes. The question yawns once more: how do we ensure racial equity and redress historical wrongs?

Gersen had covered this case for eight years, and as the first Asian-American tenured professor at Harvard Law School, she is uniquely well-positioned to tell this story. She brings to this book a deft exploration of the Asian American experience – and how it differs from that of other underrepresented groups in this country – in a manner reminiscent of Cathy Park Hong's *Minor Feelings*, making sense of the uncertain place of those in the Asian diaspora.

Jeannie Suk Gersen studied at Yale College, Oxford University, and Harvard Law School, and served as a law clerk for the United States' Supreme Court and a prosecutor at the Manhattan District Attorney's Office. She teaches at Harvard Law School and has contributed to *The New Yorker* since 2014.

The Lost Voice *A Singer's Story of Silence, Recovery, and Finding a New Song* **Greta Morgan**

Crying in H-Mart meets Wild in this memoir about losing one's voice and turning an end into a beginning

Greta Morgan, a singer-songwriter and instrumentalist with Vampire Weekend, was on the rise. In March 2020, she contracted Covid, and when the fever finally passed, she was unable to sing. Eventually, she was diagnosed with spasmodic dysphonia, a neurological voice disorder with no known cure that brought an abrupt end to her career. Her once crystalline voice was reduced to a hush.

Beyond the physical, what does it mean to cultivate a true voice? In this memoir, Morgan launches into a journey of grief and selfdiscovery, reflecting anew on when singing was a life-raft away from her repressive family culture and when she compromised her voice, contorting or silencing it to meet the demands of producers or partners. *The Lost Voice* takes us on a tour of music studios, band buses, and celebrity-filled backstage parties, but also into the red canyons of Utah and the spacial wilderness of the American southwest. In the silence, Morgan learns how to listen to parts of herself she has neglected, and ultimately, she broadens her sense of self and her definition of voice altogether.

Greta Morgan has performed as a singer-songwriter for twenty years, and she became the first woman member of Vampire Weekend, touring the world as one of their instrumentalists.

The First Fascist *The Sensational Life and Dark Legacy of the Marquis de Morès* **Sergio Luzzatto**

In the tradition of The Red Prince and The Pike, the swashbuckling biography of an underexamined but terribly influential villain, by an award-winning European historian

The book will recount the extraordinary life of French-Italian aristocrat Marquis de Morès (1858 –1896). Morès was the first populist, white supremacist, and openly anti-Semitic leader in the Western world. His sudden rise to prominence, fueled by inflammatory media rhetoric and violent stunts, took France by storm and culminated in his being one of the covert architects of the infamous Dreyfus Affair. Morès died prematurely, but his shadow continues to loom on contemporary politics. So much so, Luzzatto argues, that he can be rightfully called the first fascist.

Though largely forgotten today, the Marquis anticipated and propelled cultural, social, and political changes that would dominate the twentieth century, and that are all too familiar to the presentday reader. Identity politics, conspiracy theories, hate speech, outgroup bias: the defining features of Morès' platform come across as eerily resonant to the current moment. Drawing from a wealth of documents and original sources in English, French, and Italian, *The First Fascist* will tell of the adventurous rise and dramatic fall of the Marquis, placing it in the context of his tumultuous times, and unpacking his ominous legacy.

Sergio Luzzatto is Emiliana Pasca Noether Chair in Modern Italian History at the University of Connecticut. He was born in Italy and received his Ph.D. from Scuola Normale Superiore, Pisa, as well as from École des Hautes Études en Sciences Sociales, Paris. His works have been translated into six languages, and in 2011, his book *Padre Pio* won the Cundill History Prize. To this day, Luzzatto is the only Cundill Prize laureate whose book was not originally published in English.

The history of Russia's undercover program, from the earliest days of the Soviet Union to Putin's Russia, and how it shaped both Russia and the West

A century ago, the new Bolshevik government began sending Soviet citizens abroad as deep-cover spies, training them to pose as foreign aristocrats, merchants, and students. Over time, this became the most ambitious espionage program in human history. Many intelligence agencies use undercover operatives, but the KGB was the only one to go to such lengths, spending years training its spies to pass for foreigners, then sending them on missions that could last for decades. These spies were known as the illegals. During the Cold War, illegals were dispatched to assassinate world leaders and steal technological secrets – the greatest among them performed remarkable feats, while many others failed in their missions or cracked under the strain of living a double life.

Drawing on hundreds of hours of interviews with illegals and their descendants, as well as archival research in more than a dozen countries, Shaun Walker brings the illegals to life in a page-turning tour-de-force that takes us into the heart of the KGB's most secretive program. A riveting spy drama peopled with richly drawn characters, *The Illegals* also uncovers a hidden thread in the story of Russia itself. As Putin extols Soviet achievements and the KGB's espionage prowess, and Moscow continues to infiltrate illegals across the globe, this timely narrative shines new light on the long arc of the Soviet experiment, its messy aftermath, and its influence on our world at large.

Shaun Walker is a foreign correspondent for *The Guardian*. He lived in Moscow for more than a decade and is the author of *The Long Hangover: Putin's New Russia and the Ghosts of the Past*. His coverage of Russia's war in Ukraine was shortlisted for the Foreign Correspondent of the Year category at the 2023 British Press Awards. He frequently appears as a commentator on Russia and Ukraine for various television and radio programs, including *NPR's Fresh Air*. He currently splits his time between Warsaw, Kyiv, and London.

An intergenerational family memoir set against the backdrop of modern China by the former New York Times Beijing bureau chief

Edward Wong's father was a former soldier in the People's Liberation Army under Mao. His father came of age during the Japanese occupation in World War II, then fell under the spell of Mao's promise of a new, equitable China, spending harsh years with the Chinese army in northern China and in Xinjiang, along the Central Asian frontier. In 1962, disillusioned with Mao's brutal policies, he fled to Hong Kong and eventually went to America. Wong's father worked in Chinese restaurants and rarely spoke about his native land.

When Wong moved to Beijing as a correspondent for *The New York Times* in 2008, he had the opportunity to investigate his father's mysterious past, while also assessing for himself the dream of a resurgent China that his father once held, then abandoned. He had a front-row seat as the world's two superpowers met at a crossroads. And the years of his tenure saw China's economic boom and geopolitical expansion, as well as the darker currents of nationalism and ethnic repression and the autocratic rise of President Xi Jinping. As a son considering his father's life and his own time in China, Wong provides an epic chronicle of a family and a nation, one that spans more than eighty years and gives insight into a new authoritarian age in China that is transforming the world.

Our Kindred Creatures

Over just a few decades at the end of the nineteenth century, the United States underwent a moral revolution on behalf of animals. Before the Civil War, animals' suffering had rarely been discussed; horses pulling carriages and carts were routinely beaten in public view, and dogs were pitted against each other for entertainment and gambling. But in 1866, a group of activists began a dramatic campaign to change the nation's laws and norms, and by the century's end, most Americans had adopted a very different way of thinking and feeling about the animals in their midst.

Bill Wasik and Monica Murphy offer a history of this crusade and the battles it sparked in American life. On the side of reform were founders of the first animal-welfare societies, the American publisher of the novel *Black Beauty*, and some of the nation's earliest veterinarians and conservationists. Caught in the movement's crosshairs were transformational figures in their own right: animal impresarios such as circus ringleaders, industrial meat barons, and the nation's rising medical establishment, all of whom put forward their own, very different sets of modern norms about how animals should be treated.In recounting this remarkable period of moral transition – which, by the turn of the twentieth century, would give birth to the attitudes we hold toward animals today – Wasik and Murphy challenge us to consider the obligations we still have to all our kindred creatures.

2020 will go down alongside 1914, 1929, and 1968 as one of the most consequential years in history, and this book is the first attempt to capture the full human experience of that time.
