In the tradition of Nudge and Thinking Fast and Slow, the longanticipated book of social psychology from Princeton professor and MacArthur fellow, braiding original research and insight to bring us unexpected pathways to collective change

Betsy Levy Paluck studies the "power of the normal." The normal, or "norms," are the unwritten laws of social behavior — the customs, taboos, and traditions that we notice are accepted by our social group. We instinctively follow these rules because we all seek belonging and dignity. And yet perhaps because the force of the normal feels so natural and is largely invisible, the process of normalization is little understood. Paluck calls the force of the normal "social gravity."

Based on pathbreaking field work across the globe from a middle school in Connecticut to Rwanda post-genocide, *Social Gravity* will tell the story of this underutilized force and how we can deploy it to improve human welfare. Paluck will reshape the way we understand our social worlds and our own role in the normal at the individual, local, and global level. Folding in cutting edge research about belief in climate change, political polarization, DEI initiatives, and the growing role of AI, Paluck will help readers understand our rapidly changing world. This is a book that readers will turn to time and again whenever they need to normalize, in Paluck's words, "resolve and hope for the future."

Betsy Levy Paluck is a Professor of Psychology and of Public and International Affairs at Princeton University, and the deputy director of the Kahneman Treisman Center for Behavioral Public Policy. She received a PhD in Psychology from Yale University. She has conducted large-scale field experiments in the US, Rwanda, Democratic Republic of Congo, Nigeria, Colombia, China, Uganda, and Kenya. She is a 2017 MacArthur "Genius" Fellow, a fellow of the American Academy of Political and Social Sciences, and has received university teaching and mentoring awards from both Princeton and Yale Universities.

The Good Eye: stories (May 2026); Edited manuscript

A stone appears in a woman's pocket like a charm only to end up lodged in someone's throat. A condescending artist, who considers his wife too conventional, throws a dinner party, where he discovers a painful and consequential truth: he isn't the real creative in the family. A young and besotted apprentice haunts her mentor's lover after a stinging betrayal.

In *The Good Eye*, the world can change in an instant. The beautiful can suddenly seem grotesque, the exalted disgraced, the genius an imposter. Contradictory forces confront the men and women in Gibson's collection, as they wrestle with the limits of perception. Set in exquisite locations across the globe, in the worlds of art, crime and fantasy, these stories add up to the debut of a mature yet mischievous storyteller.

Trick: a novel (March 2028); Partial manuscript

Trick is a mystery set in Paris at the end of the 19th century: a moment of rapid scientific discovery, increasingly spectacular entertainment, and faith in the supernatural. The novel follows the intertwined lives of Jules Rouse, an itinerant thief and minor con man, and Adela Day, a young American stage spiritualist. When Jules's best friend falls from a circus trapeze, her death is called an accident, but Jules isn't so sure. At the end of a seance years later, Adela seems to send him a cryptic message from the spiritworld that might help him find out what really happened to his friend.

From the drawing rooms of bourgeois table-turners to the gritty underworld and spectacle of fin-de-siecle Paris, *Trick* is a story about belief and illusion: How do we know if we're being misled, or if what we believe is actually true? What do we hide from ourselves and can we ever be certain of our perception?

Food for the Dead: a short novel (2029); Full manuscript

This elegiac short novel concerns itself with similar themes of authenticity and fraudulence, but also grief and renewal, and what it means to live in the long shadow of personal and global history. The only child of famous literary parents, their daughter hunts through the family's archives, only to find that 1984, the year the three spent in Berlin, is missing. On a quest to put together the pieces of their story, she travels to a now transformed city, feeling as though she can't move forward in her own life unless she can complete the picture of theirs. In the divided Berlin of the early eighties, suspicion and mistrust ran rampant. Were her parents more than simply artists? Through a series of beautifully rendered encounters, she comes to discover the truth about her parents, but even more about herself.



We Survived the Night

From virtuosic writer and the first Native American director to be nominated for an Oscar, a blend of oral history, hard-hitting journalism, and a deeply personal father-son journey that culminates into a searing portrait of Indigenous survival, love, and resurgence

When Julian Brave NoiseCat's Secwépemc and St'at'imc father, an artist haunted by a turbulent past, abandoned the family, he and his non-Native mother were embraced by the urban Native community in Oakland, California as well as family on the Canim Lake Indian Reserve in British Columbia. In his father's absence, NoiseCat immersed himself in Native history and culture to understand the man he seldom saw—his past, his story, where he came from, and by extension, himself.

Years later, NoiseCat sets out across the continent to correct the erasure, invisibility, and misconceptions surrounding the First Peoples of this land, as he develops his voice as a storyteller and artist in his own right. Told in the style of a "Coyote Story," a legend about the trickster forefather of NoiseCat's people who was revered for his wit and mocked for his tendency to self-destruct, *We Survived the Night* brings a traditional artform nearly annihilated by colonization back to life on the page. Through a dazzling blend of history and mythology, memoir and reportage, NoiseCat unravels old stories and braids together new ones.

Julian Brave NoiseCat is a writer, champion powwow dancer, and student of Salish art and history. His writing has appeared in *The New York Times, The Washington Post*, and *The New Yorker*. NoiseCat won the 2022 American Mosaic Journalism Prize and several National Native Media Awards, and was named to the TIME100 Next list in 2021. He won a Directing Award at the 2024 Sundance Film Festival for his first documentary, *Sugarcane*, which was also nominated for an Academy Award for Best Documentary.



Despite the widely-accepted research proving its ineffectiveness in promoting a healthy diet and overall wellbeing, the calorie remains at the center of eating habits around the world. In order to eat better, and live better, Gersen argues that we need to disentangle the calorie from our decision making and food policy, and he teaches us how we can avoid the calorie "trap."

By telling the story of the calorie — from its "discovery" by an 18th century French lawyer, Antoine Lavoisier, to its role in government health programs today and the global food industry — *The Calorie Trap* will demonstrate how we've come to understand it so incorrectly. In the age of Ozempic, the food-as-fuel mindset has become so deeply ingrained that even when we're not consciously counting calories, its associated concepts — deprivation is "good," tasty food is "bad" — nevertheless lurk in the background. This is what Gersen calls the "calorie trap," a learned impulse to view food in these terms, and in his book, he'll offer insights and tools to help us break free. Blending history, scientific research, and insights from his years studying food policy, *The Calorie Trap* aims to launch a movement to radically shift how we think about our diet.


Jacob Gersen is the founder of the Harvard Food Law Lab and co-editor of Food Law & Policy. He has been a professor at Harvard Law School since 2011, and before that, taught at the University of Chicago Law School. His work has been published in a number of academic and mainstream outlets, including *The New York Times*, the *Wall Street Journal*, and *Forbes*.

An irreverent and sharp-witted cultural history of Mattel's Barbie and how she helps shape our understanding of modern feminism and capitalism

In June of 1952, German publishing tycoon Axel Springer was sending a new paper to print: a four-page broadsheet nearly ready, save for a narrow blank on the second page. With minutes to spare, Springer commissioned a one-block cartoon of a petite blonde with a predilection for rich men. That blonde was named "Lilli." But in a span of seven short years, she would be reborn in plastic, across an ocean, and under a different name: Barbara Millicent Roberts.

If Barbie began as a blank space, the world has spent seven decades filling it in. No doll has elicited more adoration from fans, more hatred from detractors, and more eyerolls from the indifferent. To boosters, she is the ultimate symbol of unabashed girlhood, an 11.5-inch figurine who shot to the moon before American women could get credit cards, an evolving illustration that, per one tagline, "we girls can do anything." To critics, she represents an inane vision of femininity that was going out of style just years after she was "born" — an homage to impossible body proportions, an emblem of Eurocentric beauty standards, a bimbo built on an empire of polyethylene. For everyone else, Barbie is to dolls what Xerox is to copy machines, or Kleenex is to tissues. She is, for better or for worse, an icon.


Barbie's conquest over the toy market did not happen by accident. It is the byproduct of meticulous marketing, occasional backstabbing, squadrons of designers with strong opinions on coral lip shades, and covert corporate maneuvers—many of which replicate, in miniature,

The blood-soaked global story of cobalt, the blue mineral powering the green revolution

Our world is shifting away from hydrocarbons and fossil fuels to renewable forms of power that rely more than ever on batteries. As demand for these products has grown, so has the need for minerals that are used in their production, in particular cobalt, a metallic element that is overwhelmingly mined in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, site of the world's largest cobalt reserves.

In *The Elements of Power*, *New Yorker* contributor Nicolas Niarchos takes the reader on a vivid, deeply-reported journey from the mines of Congo to the factories of China to trace the elements that have become indispensable for the technology upon which modern society is based. He explores how we became addicted to a supply chain that wreaks havoc across the globe, is defining US/China relations, and is extracting a terrible price in child labour, corruption and exploitation.

From the origins of battery technology in the 1970s, via Cold War manoeuvring, right up to the present day with companies like Tesla and Apple's reliance on cobalt, *The Elements of Power* will be the definitive account of the new mineral rush, doing for cobalt what Daniel Yergin's Pulitzer-winning *The Prize* did for oil.

Nicolas Niarchos is a journalist whose work focuses on conflicts, minerals, and migration. He has contributed to *The New Yorker* for over a decade, and his work has also been published in *The Nation*, *The Guardian*, and *The Independent*.

A sweeping, narrative look at the new wave of the labor movement and its effect on the future of capitalism

Noam Scheiber has spent nearly a decade covering labor for *The New York Times* and was one of the first journalists to cover the unionization efforts at companies such as Amazon and Starbucks. While reporting, Scheiber quickly realized that there was something deeper—the real story was not just about a few disparate companies, but was about how a new generation of employee was discovering that they have the will and the power to change the way that companies are being run, all around the globe. Scheiber coined the term "college-educated working class" to define this new generation of workers, whose economic prospects have been diminishing significantly since 2005 despite pursuing a higher education.

We Will Take Them Down promises to be the definitive book on this new generation of workers. Scheiber will deftly and empathetically dispel myths about the intentions and designs of the new generation of employees. Contrary to the beliefs of corporate leadership, they aren't just looking for a raise or better healthcare benefits, they are looking to recalibrate the power dynamics between management and labor. This book will be a character-driven investigation of the revolts that are succeeding across various industries for the first time in nearly fifty years. It promises to answer the questions: Who are these people, what do they want, and what do they have to lose? Why are they making so many demands? And will they change the face of capitalism?

Noam Scheiber covers workers and the workplace for *The New York Times*. Before joining the paper, he spent nearly fifteen years at *The New Republic*, where he covered labor, economic policy, and three presidential campaigns. His book *The Escape Artists* is a narrative of the Obama administration's efforts to save the economy from the Great Recession. He holds a master's degree in economics from the University of Oxford.



The book will recount the extraordinary life of French-Italian aristocrat Marquis de Morès (1858 –1896). Morès was the first populist, white supremacist, and openly anti-Semitic leader in the Western world. His sudden rise to prominence, fueled by inflammatory media rhetoric and violent stunts, took France by storm and culminated in his being one of the covert architects of the infamous Dreyfus Affair. Morès died prematurely, but his shadow continues to loom on contemporary politics. So much so, Luzzatto argues, that he can be rightfully called the first fascist.

Though largely forgotten today, the Marquis anticipated and propelled cultural, social, and political changes that would dominate the twentieth century, and that are all too familiar to the present-day reader. Identity politics, conspiracy theories, hate speech, outgroup bias: the defining features of Morès' platform come across as eerily resonant to the current moment. Drawing from a wealth of documents and original sources in English, French, and Italian, *The First Fascist* will tell of the adventurous rise and dramatic fall of the Marquis, placing it in the context of his tumultuous times, and unpacking his ominous legacy.


Sergio Luzzatto is Emiliana Pasca Noether Chair in Modern Italian History at the University of Connecticut. He was born in Italy and received his Ph.D. from Scuola Normale Superiore, Pisa, as well as from École des Hautes Études en Sciences Sociales, Paris. His works have been translated into six languages, and in 2011, his book Padre Pio won the Cundill History Prize. To this day, Luzzatto is the only Cundill Prize laureate whose book was not originally published in English.

Sophie Gilbert identifies an inflection point in the late 1990s and early 2000s when the energy of third-wave and "riot girrrl" feminism collapsed into a regressive period of hyper-objectification, sexualization, and infantilization. Gilbert mines the darker side of nostalgia, training her keen analytic eye on the most revealing cultural objects of the 21st century, across music, film, television, fashion, tabloid journalism, and more. And what she recounts is harrowing, from the leering aesthetic of American Apparel ads and explicit music videos to a burgeoning internet culture vicious towards women in the spotlight and damaging for those who weren't. Gilbert tracks many of the period's dominant themes back to the explosion of internet porn, tracing its widespread influence as it began to pervade our collective consciousness.

Gilbert paints a devastating picture of an era when a distinct confluence of excess, materialism, and power-worship collided with reactionary, puritanical, and chauvinistic currents. Amid a collective reconsideration of the way women are treated in public, *Girl on Girl* is a blistering indictment of the matrix of misogyny that undergirded the cultural production of the early twenty-first century, and how it continues to shape our world today.



In this deeply reported book in the tradition of *Evicted* by Matthew Desmond and *Invisible Child* by Andrea Elliott, anthropologist and journalist Brian Goldstone plunges readers into the lives of the working homeless: people with full-time jobs who cannot keep a roof over their head, especially in booming cities, where rapid growth is leading to catastrophic displacement. 

The history of Russia's undercover program, from the Soviet Union to Putin's Russia, and how it shaped both Russia and the West

A century ago, the new Bolshevik government began sending Soviet citizens abroad as deep-cover spies, training them to pose as foreign aristocrats, merchants, and students. Over time, this became the most ambitious espionage program in human history. Many intelligence agencies use undercover operatives, but the KGB was the only one to go to such lengths, spending years training its spies to pass for foreigners, then sending them on missions that could last for decades. These spies were known as the illegals. During the Cold War, illegals were dispatched to assassinate world leaders and steal technological secrets—the greatest among them performed remarkable feats, while many others failed in their missions or cracked under the strain of living a double life.

Drawing on hundreds of hours of interviews with illegals and their descendants, as well as archival research in more than a dozen countries, Shaun Walker brings the illegals to life in a page-turning tour-de-force that takes us into the heart of the KGB's most secretive program. A riveting spy drama peopled with richly drawn characters, *The Illegals* also uncovers a hidden thread in the story of Russia itself. As Putin extols Soviet achievements and the KGB's espionage prowess, and Moscow continues to infiltrate illegals across the globe, this timely narrative shines new light on the long arc of the Soviet experiment, its messy aftermath, and its influence on our world at large.



A memoir and history of Native American boarding schools in the U.S., and the legacy of abuse wrought by systemic attempts to use education as a tool through which to destroy Native culture

From the mid-19th century to the late 1930s, tens of thousands of Native children were pulled from their families to attend boarding schools that claimed to help create opportunity for these children to pursue professions outside their communities and otherwise "assimilate" into American life. In reality, these boarding schools—sponsored by the US Government but often run by various religious orders with little to no regulation—were an insidious attempt to destroy tribes, break up families, and stamp out the traditions of generations of Native people. Children were beaten for speaking their native languages, forced to complete menial tasks in terrible conditions, and utterly deprived of love and affection.

Ojibwe journalist Mary Pember's mother was forced to attend one of these institutions—a seminary in Wisconsin—and the impacts of her experience have cast a pall over Mary's own childhood, and her relationship with her mother. Highlighting both her mother's experience and the experiences of countless other students at such schools, their families, and their children, *Medicine River* paints a stark portrait of communities still reckoning with the legacy of acculturation that has affected generations of Native communities. Through interviews and historical reporting, Pember traces the evolution and continued rebirth of a culture whose country has been seemingly intent upon destroying it.

We take it for granted that good neighborhoods—with good schools and good housing—are only accessible to the wealthy. But this wasn't always the case. Though for most of world history, your prospects were tied to where you were born, Americans came up with a revolutionary idea: if you didn't like your lot in life, you could find a better location and reinvent yourself there. Americans moved to new places with unprecedented frequency, and, for two hundred years, that remarkable mobility was the linchpin of the country's economic and social opportunity.

In this illuminating debut, Yoni Appelbaum shows us that this idea has been under attack since reformers first developed zoning laws to ghettoize Chinese Americans in nineteenth-century Modesto, California. The century of legal segregation that ensued — from the zoning laws enacted to force Jewish workers back into New York's Lower East Side to the private-sector discrimination and racist public policy that trapped Black families in Flint, Michigan to Jane Jacobs' efforts to protect her vision of the West Village — has raised housing prices, deepened political divides, emboldened bigots, and trapped generations of people in poverty. What China's Present Tells Us About America's Future

In 2022, Chang Che was present for the anti-lockdown protests in Urumqi and reported on the "people's war" against the virus for *The New Yorker* and *The Atlantic*, as China's pandemic measures backfired on its people. Writing for *The New York Times* from Seoul, Che documented the economic strain, and the human toll. In the years since, he has witnessed a widening and intractable divide between state and society: record numbers of emigration, waves of young professionals hosting "resignation parties" from lucrative careers, others seeking solace in spiritual escape. The great age of Chinese Ambition had come to an end.

In *Age of Disenchantment*, Che offers a definitive update on the China story. But as it brings the country's domestic crisis into focus, it draws remarkable parallels with another global superpower, the United States: vast inequality, a housing affordability crisis, an unforgiving meritocracy, a rising techno-plutocracy, and the resurgence of nationalism and traditional values. In many ways, the book argues, China's story is also found abroad. No other nation had so fully embraced the American Dream as its Communist rival. When the promise of growth and social mobility fueling aspiration began to crumble in the late 2000s, the Chinese reacted in the same way Americans would a decade later: by placing their faith in a strongman who would restore discipline, and greatness. A rise to power on a wave of social unrest and discontent—as seen in the emergence of charismatic Chinese princeling Bo Xilai, followed swiftly by Xi Jinping—is all too recognizable in the trajectory of authoritarian leaders worldwide. Che weaves together years of reporting into an invaluable and original argument: rather than continuing to cast China as an enemy in a global power struggle, we must recognize how China's present malaise and disaffection is borne from social and political forces that parallel those around the world.



The Waterbearers begins in a house along a bayou in Texas, a home bought and paid for—and run—by the author's grandmother. Betty Jean spent twenty summers in the swamplands of Louisiana as a cotton tenant farmer before coming north to Texas in the Great Migration. It was there that she would raise her eleven children, most by different fathers whom she rarely kept around. Mama Connie, one of those eleven, grew up under her mother's controlling hand and struggled to forgive, vowing that her life would be different. But when it came to having children of her own, she was more like Betty Jean than she cared to admit. She made her home just a few blocks away, and received the same nickname as her mother, the "Black Widow." And, like her mother before her, Connie's sweat was the founding salt of her own universe.

Today, Sasha Bonét, like each woman before her, wrangles with the pull of her mother's orbit, the austerity and love from which it came. She is the first in her family to look to the past in order to radically reimagine her future, and the future of her daughter. In fostering a community of motherhood, Bonét interrogates all aspects of being a mother—escape and promise, burden, assent, and rebellion—not just for those who came before her, but for those Black women with whom society is acquainted, too: Nina Simone; Oprah Winfrey; Audre Lorde, and Darnella Fraiser, who filmed the murder of George Floyd and mobilized the world.
