

When he's not writing, Grisham serves on the board of directors of the Innocence Project and of Centurion Ministries, two national organizations dedicated to exonerating those who have been wrongfully convicted. Much of his fiction explores deep-seated problems in our criminal justice system. Grisham lives on a farm in central Virginia.





Junior commodities analyst Bea Macon prizes security and control over adventure — especially after being raised by free-spirit Christy, lately living it up in Utah on her estranged daughter's dime. But after Bea takes an uncharacteristic risk at work that fails spectacularly, resulting in her dismissal and a Wall Street-wide shunning, she's in free-fall with nowhere to turn but her mother's unappealing doorstep. When Bea lands in Salt Lake City (refusing to admit her failures), she's stunned to discover Christy has secrets of her own. There's a man. There's a map. There's...\$1M in buried treasure? And this: Christy might be close to finding it.

ACCUMULATION is a cinematic, literary tour de force that's as funny and heartbreaking as it is high-stakes and fast-paced. In tonal kinship with Joy Williams, Kevin Wilson, and the television series *Hacks*, Boland's novel grapples with everything from millennial economic fragility and what it means to un-choose New York to Southwestern water insecurity and growing distrust of federal government in rural communities, and beyond. At its heart, ACCUMULATION is an unforgettable mother-daughter story about two women who, reunited at last, are running out of money and options. In a small town called Mercy, they find their way back to each other — and so much more.

Kathleen Boland's fiction has appeared in Tin House, Conjunctions, and Gulf Coast, among other places, and she has received support from the Tin House Summer Workshop, Bread Loaf Writers Conference, and the Vermont Studio Center. For almost five years, she worked as the event director for Catapult/Counterpoint Press/Soft Skull Press, where she was responsible for all book tours and major events. Before working in publishing, she earned her MFA from Louisiana State University and received the Robert Penn Warren Thesis Award. She currently lives in Portland, Oregon







The Phoenix Pencil Company combines the cross-generational relationships and epistolary form of Ruth Ozeki's A Tale For The Time Being with the magical alternate history and probing questions of R.F. Kuang's Babel. Told in dual timelines, its overarching question is: who owns a story?

Yun is a ninety-year-old woman recounting her time growing up in the Phoenix Pencil Company in 1940s Shanghai. While Japan invades China, Yun's cousin moves in with them, and the two develop a competitive yet loving relationship. When the government discovers their family can magically Reforge a pencil's words, bringing its words back to life, the cousins are separated and forced into a life of betraying stories in order to survive. Monica is Yun's granddaughter, a modern-day college student in America, set on using her software engineering skills to help reunite Yun with her long lost cousin. Through her attempts, she meets Louise, an aspiring digital archivist, ruthlessly determined to record the stories of those who survived World War II. As Monica learns more of Yun's story, she must confront the same questions her grandmother once did—of what kinds of stories should be preserved, and when data should be left private—all while navigating her growing feelings towards Louise.

Allison King is a software engineer based in Cambridge, Massachusetts, and has dedicated time to sharing local community stories and working in data privacy. A story of hers is to be featured on LeVar Burton's podcast this fall, and other pieces have appeared in Fantasy Magazine, Diabolical Plots, and Paula Guran's Year's Best Fantasy, among others. She is also a 2023 Reese's Book Club LitUp fellow.

In September of 2019, Luis Alberto Quiñonez—known as Sito— was shot to death as he sat in his car in the Mission District of San Francisco. He was nineteen. 

When Jenisha Watts published her <u>Atlantic cover story</u> in September 2023, the response was swift, enthusiastic, and staggering in scale. Her story was shared widely online and her physical mailbox overflowed with letters of care and support from her countless friends in the media and from as far away as Australia and South Africa. Each missive carried the same message: What a lyrical, shattering essay. What incredible courage it must have taken to write. I've connected with your story more than I thought was possible. Thank you, thank you, thank you. Jenisha herself was blown away by the feedback.

For her entire adult life, as she moved up in the literary world and rose to be a Senior Editor at The Atlantic, none of her colleagues and few of her friends were aware of the extent to which Jenisha was struggling to survive. Even fewer knew the circumstances of her childhood in Kentucky—the addiction, violence, and poverty that marred her closest relationships and put her at tremendous disadvantages compared to her peers in so many arenas of life. The profound responses to her piece have galvanized her to break our culture of secrecy and shame around poverty and to tell the world the deeper story of her past. In *Nisha from Kentucky*, Jenisha flexes the gift she has for "writing things down to make people feel things." Hers is a memoir of resilience, of commitment to your dreams, and of excavating the wounds of childhood to help yourself get free. She turns her canny editorial eye and reporter's nose for detail on herself, unafraid to dig deeper into uncomfortable feelings and the messiness of family.







For thousands of years, people have argued about whether humanity is selfish or generous, cruel or kind. But recently, our answers have changed. In 1972, half of Americans agreed that most people can be trusted; by 2018, that figure had fallen to 30%. Different generations, genders, religions, and political parties can't seem to agree on anything, except that they all think human virtue is evaporating. Cynicism is a perfectly understandable response to a world full of injustice and inequality. But in many cases, cynicism is misplaced and cynical thinking worsens social problems, because our beliefs don't just interpret the world—they change it. When we expect people to be awful, we coax awfulness out of them. Cynicism is a disease, with a history, symptoms--and a cure.
