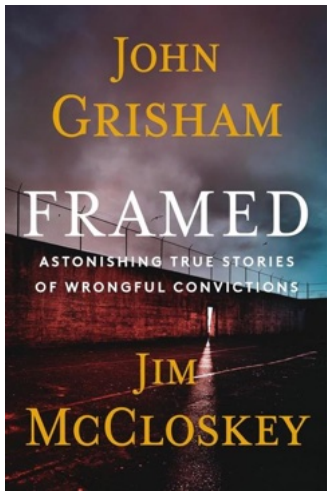

In John Grisham’s first work of nonfiction since *The Innocent Man*, “the master of the legal thriller” (Associated Press) teams up with Jim McCloskey, “the godfather of the innocence movement” (*Texas Monthly*), to share ten harrowing true stories of wrongful convictions.

John Grisham is known worldwide for his bestselling novels, but it’s his real-life passion for justice that led to his work with Jim McCloskey of Centurion Ministries, the first organization dedicated to exonerating innocent people who have been wrongly convicted. Together they offer an inside look at the many injustices in America’s criminal justice system.

A fundamental principle of the US legal system is a presumption of innocence, but once someone has been found guilty, there is very little room to prove doubt. These ten true stories shed light on Americans who were innocent but found guilty and forced to sacrifice friends, families, and decades of their lives to prison while the guilty parties remained free. In each of the stories, John Grisham and Jim McCloskey recount the dramatic hard-fought battles for exoneration.

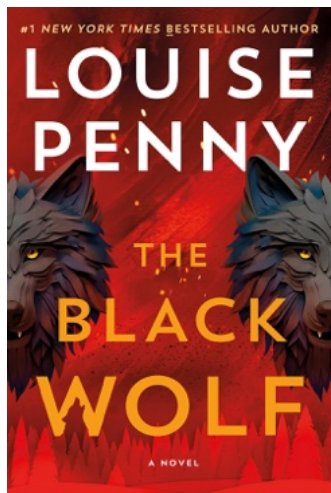

John Grisham is the author of fifty consecutive #1 bestsellers, which have been translated into nearly fifty languages. Grisham is a two-time winner of the Harper Lee Prize for Legal Fiction and was honored with the Library of Congress Creative Achievement Award for Fiction. When he’s not writing, Grisham serves on the board of directors of the Innocence Project and of Centurion Ministries, two national organizations dedicated to exonerating those who have been wrongfully convicted.

Jim McCloskey founded Centurion Ministries, the first organization in the world devoted to freeing the wrongly convicted. Since its establishment forty years ago, Centurion has freed seventy individuals, all of whom spent decades in prison serving life or death sentences for the crimes of others. McCloskey has a Master of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary. His memoir, *When Truth Is All You Have*, was published by Doubleday in 2020.

Gamache and his small team of supporters realize that for the Black Wolf to have gotten this far, they must have powerful allies, in law enforcement, in industry, in organized crime, in the halls of government.

From the apparent peace of his little village, Gamache finds himself playing a lethal game of cat and mouse with an invisible foe who is gathering forces and preparing to strike.

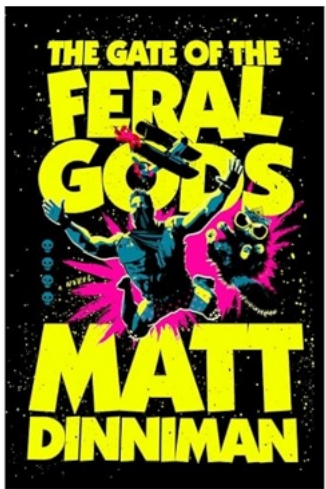

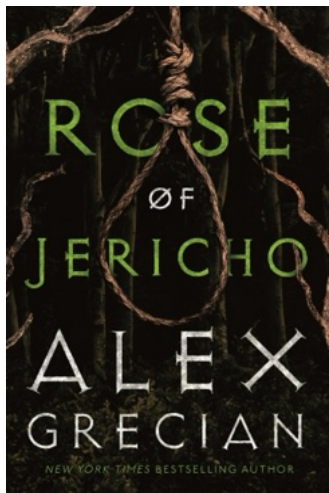

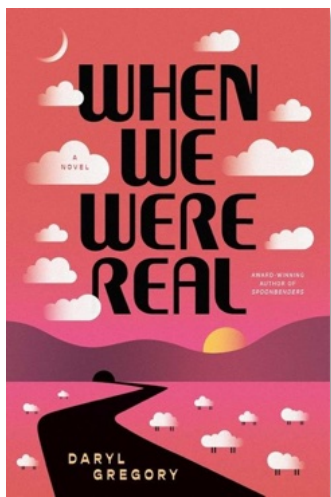

JP and Dulin have been the best of friends for decades. When JP finds out his cancer has aggressively returned, Dulin decides it's the perfect time for one last adventure: a week-long bus tour of North America's *Impossibles*, the physics-defying glitches and geographic miracles that started cropping up seven years earlier—right after the Announcement that revealed our world to be merely a digital simulacrum. The outing, courtesy of Canterbury Trails Tours, promises the trip of a (not completely real) lifetime in a (not completely deluxe) coach.

Their fellow passengers are 21st-century pilgrims, each of them on the tour for their own reasons. Each stop on this trip is stranger than the last—a Tunnel outside of time, a zero gravity Geysir, the compound of motivational-speaking avatar—with everyone barreling toward the tour's iconic final stop Ghost City, where unbeknownst to our travelers the answer to who is running the simulation may await.

My mother took my sister and me, and she drove through the night to a place she felt a claim to, a place on earth she thought we might be safe. I stopped asking questions. I picked little glass pieces from my sister's hair. I watched the moon.

Now she knows that the rules are meant to serve some folks better than others; and, actually, they serve no one all that well—not even Kreizman. Disturbed by the depth and scope of the liberal myths in which she

once so fervently believed, Kreizman takes readers on an intimate journey that revisits some of her most profound revelations, demonstrating that it’s never too late to become radicalized.

With Kreizman’s signature wit and blunt self-reflection, and more than a little transformative rage, *I Want to Burn This Place Down* is a book for anyone who wishes they could go back in time to give their younger selves the real truth about the fractured country they have inherited—and the encouragement to rebuild something better in its place.

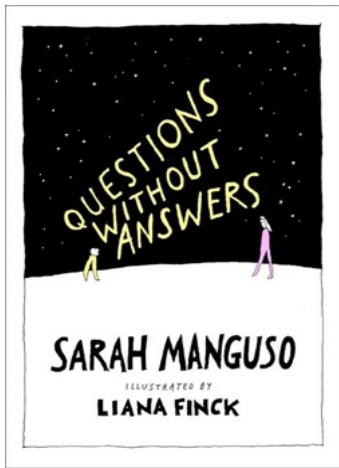

Mary Shelly wrote *Frankenstein* in the dark and cold of the summer of 1816. Just eighteen at the time, she had eloped to Switzerland with her lover, the already-married Percy Bysshe Shelley. Besides, Mary had nothing to worry about: Claire was infatuated with Lord Byron, as were half the women in England—though Claire had the rare distinction of being pregnant with his child.

The trio rented a villa on Lake Geneva to hide out from Shelley's enraged wife and creditors, and Mary's equally enraged father, a famed anarchist political philosopher who did not support his daughters practicing the free love he preached. Lord Byron would soon join them—he was escaping the pressures of his immense literary fame as well as the scandal he'd created back in England thanks to a very public affair he'd carried on with his beautiful half-sister. Byron brought along his personal physician, one John Polidori, making sure everyone was well-stocked with laudanum. That summer, as Mary was dreaming up *Frankenstein*, Polidori would write "The Vampyre," literature's very first seductive vampire and the beginnings of a mythology as powerful as Mary's mad scientist.

How did all these dark and enduring fantasies come to be born in the same Swiss villa in a few short months? There's a reason why *Frankenstein* remains the most widely assigned novel in American universities—in the story behind the novel, Andrew Stauffer explores the cult of the artist and the seduction of literary celebrity, a vision of literature as the stuff of expressive passion, imaginative genius, and inspired originality that have dominated our conception of art ever since.

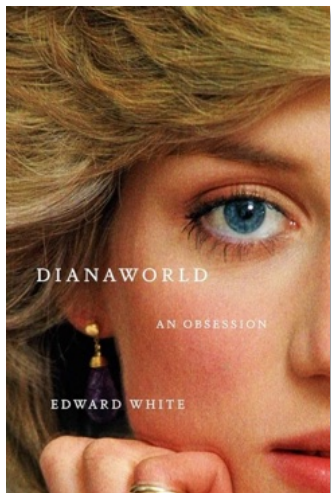
