

In *Thirteen Question Method*, a man hides out in a Hollywood apartment from a past he doesn't want to remember and a present he is desperate to avoid. The summer sky is thick with ash, and across the courtyard, his neighbor won't stop screaming. When she asks for help in an inheritance dispute with her estranged stepmother, he is drawn into a web of fear and manipulation, until he begins to lose sight of what is real.

Echoing the work of Dorothy B. Hughes and James M. Cain, David Goodis and Albert Camus, *Thirteen Question Method* is a churning psychological thriller, set against the backdrop of contemporary Los Angeles. In a novel inspired by classic noir, David L. Ulin excavates the depths of a disintegrating soul.



Tokyo, in the early aughts, was a weird place. Lonely single men wanted to marry action figures instead of women. High school girls worked at maid cafes and were paid to act like Manga characters. Nightclubs filled with kids in anime cosplay who danced to remixed versions of cartoon theme songs. People's private obsessions, once confined to bedrooms and computer screens, were transforming entire city blocks.

Long before global media, Pharrell Williams, and millions of tourists twigged to the strange new energy emerging from Japan, author Patrick Macias was there, chronicling the emergence of "Cool Japan" in a famous blog entitled "An Eternal Thought in the Mind of Godzilla." Now with biting humor and cultural insight, he looks back on the trends, personalities, and happenings that dominated the bleeding edge of Japanese pop culture in those years. 

In a tough neighborhood on the outskirts of Toronto, miles away from wealthy white downtown, Omer Aziz struggles to find his place as a first-generation Pakistani Muslim boy. 

Former Sheriff Jules Clement returns in this new installment of the celebrated mystery series, set once again in the wild, strange, windy town of Blue Deer, Montana, where your neighbors or the tourists can be just as deadly as the weather.

It's 1997 and Jules Clement has everything he's ever wanted: a happy marriage, a new baby, and a job as an archaeologist with a sideline as a private investigator. He and his wife Caroline are planning to build a house on an idyllic patch of river bottomland in Blue Deer, Montana. But everything that can go wrong will, in terms of money, love, land, murder: the neighbors hire Jules to spy on each other, the county hires him to find out if a road runs over some misplaced bodies in a long abandoned potter's field, a former priest with a sideline in extortion ends up very dead, a crew of Russians in fast cars is running amok through the Montana summer, and Jules' nemesis returns, forcing him to confront the death he's been avoiding his whole adult life: his father's.




BOOK TWO: GOING LOCAL

A camper's discovery of old bones threatens to expose secrets long and deliberately buried in the hearts and minds of the town's oldest citizens. Jules's investigation mushrooms into a nightmare of long-simmering enmities, love affairs, arson, and murder.



BOOK FOUR: BLUE DEER THAW

A woman freezes to death in a snowdrift, and Jules follows the mystery back to the newly renovated Sacajawea Hotel, where he's cataloging antiquities for the owner. What seems like a simple tragedy plays out as a more complex story of family greed and revenge; for Jules, it will mean both love and tragedy. The reluctant sheriff will have to face the arctic winter in his search for clues to multiple murders, and the town of Blue Deer will never be the same.






